4.5 billion people worldwide lack safely managed sanitation services.



Diseases transmitted through human waste contaminated water include diarrhea, cholera, dysentery, typhoid and hepatitis and cause 115 deaths every hour in Africa alone.

In studies funded by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, they estimate that, in some areas, less than 2 percent of the

fecal waste is being properly treated, with the rest being released to the environment untreated.
